**EOS Mission**—We are coordinating communication efforts from other committees, and providing input to NADP document production

NADP Factsheet – document review and production, will go to NADP Exec this month, will need to be updated annually as a fact sheet—EOS and Exec will need to decide what the review schedule will be

What is our capacity? EOS has three officers, none of whom have formal jobs as communication staff. Can offices with communication staff formally invite their comm officers to EOS meetings and EOS efforts? USGS has a social media person, Linda Geiser suggests bringing in USFS people and bringing in people EARLY—six months in advance, meet once a month, Kris Novak suggests ICSD folks (Claire and Jenna)

**NADP Presentation toolkit**—we had a suggestion that we feature success stories based on NADP monitoring and data. For example, Great Smoky Mountains National Park has documented reductions in acid rain using their long-term NTN and AQ monitoring.

--Suggestion that as the Mercury network highlights each individual site, NTN needs site-specific highlights that will be accessible to the public.

--USGS wants to highlight operators and particular sites as important to the network

--RTI: Case studies: train derailment, tie to community organizers for AQ, outreach stories-EJ

--FS: Linda Geiser and Aaron Pena just finished interviewing the 33 FS site operators, the two things that they heard---1)they were using the data on their unit in their monitoring for forest plans, which would make a good success story for the NADP slide deck, and 2) people have a lot of pride in being part of the national network. LG would like to be able to show how this work ties to other important issues, CC, smoke, would like to show the variety and diversity of sites and site operators

David Gay—the program did site specific reports for NC at one point, it is still an option that the lab could do site-specific reports; Cari Furness was involved in the NC site-specific reports, which included EPA modeling efforts by Schwede and Walker to show what happens when sites are lost

**Social media update**—We have 350 followers on Facebook, Instagram has 50 followers, most who engage with social media are meeting attendees or work at SLH, LinkedIn has 94 followers. We had a

wide-ranging discussion on how we could increase engagement and why the social media accounts are important:

-repost from another agency with a larger audience, or scientific organizations, or advocacy groups, or gardening influencers

-run an air quality AMA at Reddit, find and participate in Reddit AQ forums

-attend UW-Madison campus events

-the internet abhors a vacuum—if there is not truthful and factual information on social media, misinformation goes unchallenged

-site operators have great stories which we could tell on our accounts

-UW journalism or communication students may be able to work on NADP projects as interns or for class projects

-suggestion that we connect with Jan Klawitter at WSLH who does PR

Our barriers to increasing engagement:

-NADP does not have staff dedicated to communications, and the EOS officers are not communication staff

-Social media accounts with large followings require continuous engagement

-many of the people in EOS and in NADP more broadly do not use social media and will require expert help to increase engagement

-Richard Tanabe is handling the social media accounts and does not think the current situation in which committees create content and he submits the posts—is sustainable

**Student presentation awards -** very popular with students and judges, reviews are shared on science content and presentation.

Ellis Cowling Award - This fall, the award will pay for students lodging and a breakfast to students, we have plans to advertise to institutions within driving distance.
